Led by Founder/Artistic Director Debra Loewen, Wild Space Dance Company has intrigued audiences for 35 years. Known for site-specific works and artistic collaborations, Wild Space takes audiences on adventures through built and natural landscapes, visual art, history and the human condition through wry humor, clever choreography and emotionally-charged dance.

The mission of Milwaukee-based Wild Space Dance Company is to explore diverse cultural landscapes to create provocative new choreography, site-based performances, and educational opportunities. The company cultivates creative experimentation, innovation, and collaboration by investing in local artists, and engages audiences with dance in a shared experience of place and community.

Loewen and the company are critically acclaimed and have been cited among the city's top ten performances of the year by the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel. Recent performances have featured collaborations with nationally acclaimed photographer Tom Bamberger, internationally renowned sound artist Amanda Schoofs, Lynden Sculpture Garden, and Milwaukee Art Museum. Wild Space has performed in Japan, South Korea, Minneapolis, Chicago, New York, and throughout southeastern Wisconsin.

An affiliate of United Performing Arts Fund, Wild Space is a company-in-residence at Lincoln Center Middle School of the Arts. Over the past three seasons, Wild Space outreach programs have engaged more than 3,300 youth. Since 2020, the Wild Space Board has focused on strengthening Diversity, Equity & Inclusion practices at all organizational levels. Wild Space's newest initiative, InSite: Choreographic Exchange, financially supports dance artists of color to create new works in underserved neighborhoods and learn from the company's 35-year legacy. This past May, in partnership with the Urban Ecology Center, "InSite: Dances for Washington Park" celebrated public spaces and park designer Frederick Law Olmstead with free public performances.

through dances choreographed and performed by 20 diverse artists representing the histories, cultures, and present-day stories of the people there.

After a pre-show talk by Milwaukee Author/Historian John Gurda, audiences will be guided along the cemetery's landscaped pathways. Crafted as a moving narrative of Milwaukee's diverse history, intimate dance dioramas appear among the statuary of Black leaders; the mounds of the indigenous; an island reserved for Hmong burials; the Lady of Guadalupe gardens; and the headstone honoring George Marshall Clark, the only recorded lynching victim in the city's history. Burial customs, rituals and traditions become dances about respect, honor, and belonging. The hour-long program culminates with a dance inspired by the Lincoln Village community.

"Everyone is Welcome" is a free, public performance that celebrates belonging in the racially segregated City of Milwaukee by uplifting the histories and present-day stories of its diverse populations through dances created and performed by artists of color at Forest Home Cemetery and Arboretum, a public cemetery open to all in Milwaukee's diverse Southside Lincoln Village. Project content and research methods will address the following questions:

- How do individuals, organizations, and communities construct belonging and practice equity and inclusion?
 - How do public places/spaces cultivate belonging?
- What do storytelling and representation of diverse individuals/communities contribute to processes of belonging, equity and inclusion?

Wild Space Dance Company focuses its activities in the City of Milwaukee, which is the second most segregated city and metropolitan area in the country (Brown University Diversity and Disparity Project, https://s4.ad.brown.edu/projects/diversity/). Since 2020, the Wild Space Board has undertaken efforts to strengthen the organization's Diversity, Equity & Inclusion practices at all programmatic and operational levels. An outgrowth of these efforts, "Everyone is Welcome" is a free, public performance created onsite at the historic Forest Home Cemetery and Arboretum, and crafted as a moving narrative of Milwaukee's diverse past and present. Produced by Wild Space in partnership with Forest Home Cemetery, the project will be created by 20 diverse choreographers, dancers, and musicians, and engage 1,200 diverse audiences from

nearby neighborhoods and beyond through 3 free, public performances and 3 open rehearsals in May/June 2023. Two-thirds of artists hired will represent Black, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC) communities.

Wild Space will commission 5 choreographers of color to make new works through its newest initiative, InSite: Choreographic Exchange. In 2020, the majority (56%) of professional dancers/choreographers in the United States were White (Non-Hispanic), with the second most common race/ethnicity (16%) being Black (Non-Hispanic) (https://datausa.io/). Addressing racial disparities in dance and promoting cultural inclusivity, the InSite program financially supports choreographers of color to create new works in underserved neighborhoods and learn from Wild Space's 35-year legacy of site-based dancemaking.

The InSite program successfully premiered in May 2022 in partnership with the Urban Ecology Center with "InSite: Dances for Washington Park," celebrating public spaces and park designer Frederick Law Olmstead with free public performances and new site-based works by Tisiphani Mayfield (African American) and Alisha Jihn (Asian American). Of her experience, Jihn said, "one of the most important goals for myself was to create work that was informed by my identity and experience as an Asian American woman. I think that each section of the show developed beautifully to recognize past traumas, joys, and look towards offering hope in the future."

Confirmed choreographers for "Everyone is Welcome" are Yeng Vang-Strath (Hmong American) and Dijon Michelle Kirkland (African American). Both have danced with Wild Space. Additional choreographers under consideration are Cuauhtli Ramirez Castro (Mexican American), dancer and teacher with Wild Space; Karlies Kelley Vedula (Panamanian American), founder/director of Panadanza Dance Company; Imani Jalil (Hispanic), dancer/choreographer and teacher with Bembé Drum & Dance; Desmond Cotton (African American), guest dancer with Wild Space and Milwaukee Public Schools dance educator; and Simone Linhares Ferro (Brazilian American), Wild Space guest dancer and Dance Professor Emerita, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee.

The choreographers will undertake historical and movement-based research to create and perform dances celebrating belonging and embodying the experiences of diverse Milwaukeeans and cultural communities represented at Forest Home Cemetery, in the surrounding neighborhoods, and amongst the collaborating artists of color. Crafted as a moving narrative of Milwaukee's diverse history, intimate dance dioramas will explore burial customs, rituals and traditions that become dances about respect, honor, and belonging. Vang-Strath will create an original piece of choreography inspired by the histories of Hmong American refugees buried at an island, as well as her own lived experience as a Hmong American woman. Kirkland will create a new work foregrounding the tombstones of Black leaders and abolitionists, focusing on female leaders Ardie Clark Halyard and Marcia P. Coggs. Additional sites under consideration are indigenous burial mounds; the Lady of Guadalupe gardens; and the headstone honoring George Marshall Clark, the only recorded lynching victim in the city's history. The hour-long program will culminate with a dance inspired by the Lincoln Village community.

Primary humanities expert, Milwaukee Author/Historian John Gurda, will contribute historical content to the dance performance and program notes/study guide, and conduct a pre-show lecture followed by Q&A prior to each public performance, focusing on the history of Forest Home Cemetery, the evolution of its demographics and burial practices as a reflection of social changes, and the diverse people, cultures, and traditions represented there. Established in 1850 as a cemetery for the city, Forest Home has always been a place of peace and dignity for all. A final resting place for peoples of European, African, Asian, Muslim, and Hispanic descent, the cemetery honors and celebrates diverse cultural traditions and burial rites.

Located in a dense urban area with many new immigrants, Forest Home is the largest greenspace on Milwaukee's near south side and is open to the public seven days a week from dawn until dusk, providing a haven from the city. Designed by Wisconsin author, scientist, and naturalist Increase A. Lapham, Forest Home is modeled after the garden style cemeteries of the Victorian Era. Preserving the natural qualities of the land, it is the first accredited arboretum in Milwaukee, filled with more than 100 tree species, as well as dramatic natural landscapes, curved roadways, artful plantings, and opulent monuments.

Gurda plans to focus his research and talk on Forest Home's origins and development, highlighting:

- The fundamentally egalitarian character of human life that we all "decay to the same elements" represented by the diversity of Forest Home's resident dead. Although it was founded by an affluent Protestant congregation and patronized at first by affluent Protestant families, Forest Home has evolved to serve a wide range of local ethnic groups, including German, Latino, Hmong, Muslim, and Black.
- Changing American attitudes towards death, from historical burial practices to the evolution of modern burial rites, and Forest Home's honoring of a rich array of multicultural burial traditions.

Early on, secondary humanities expert Victoria Isaac, M.A., an African American sociologist, educator, and dancer/choreographer, will provide trainings for Project/Artistic Director Debra Loewen, Wild Space Board and staff to strengthen the project and organization's commitment to diverse cultural exploration, creativity and community engagement by presenting research on how systemic oppression hinders the creative expression of socially marginalized populations, and offering tools in anti-bias, culturally relevant and responsive frameworks for teaching and community engagement. Project/Artistic Director Loewen will employ these approaches in working with the project's diverse choreographers and dancers/musicians of color, the Forest Home and Lincoln Village communities, and the diverse audiences who will attend.

An outgrowth of these efforts, "Everyone is Welcome" is a free, public performance that celebrates belonging in the racially segregated City of Milwaukee by uplifting the histories and present-day stories of its diverse populations through dances created and performed by artists of color at Forest Home Cemetery and Arboretum, a public cemetery open to all in Milwaukee's diverse Southside Lincoln Village. Produced by Wild Space in partnership with Forest Home Cemetery, with research assistance by primary humanities expert, Author/Historian John Gurda, and second humanities expert, Sociologist/Educator/Dancer Victoria Isaac, the project will be created by 20 diverse choreographers, dancers, and musicians, and engage 1,200 diverse audiences from nearby neighborhoods and beyond through 3 free, public performances and 3 open rehearsals in May/June 2023.

- "Everyone is Welcome" will impact the collaborating organizations and community by:
- Celebrating Milwaukee and Wisconsin's diverse past and present through dance performances and stories of its people that cultivate respect, honor and belonging.
- Welcoming patrons new and old to a site of historical significance and present-day community resource, thereby expanding awareness of Forest Home Cemetery and Arboretum and supporting this organization in its strategic plan to increase community outreach and service.
- Bringing Milwaukee and Wisconsin history and contemporary dance to new audiences through 3 performances and 3 open rehearsals offered free-of-charge.
- Increasing Wild Space's community involvement through strategic collaborations with a National and State of Wisconsin Historic Landmark and the Wisconsin Humanities Council.
- Engaging performance audiences and collaborating artists in exploring the people, histories and influences that have and continue to shape a historic landmark and the broader Milwaukee community.
- Bringing recognition to a landmark that represents Milwaukee's history and its changing communities, based on Wild Space's critically and nationally acclaimed, 35-year legacy of site-specific work and artistic collaborations.
- Deepening Wild Space's involvement with the humanities and collaboration with community organizations.
- Raising awareness of the community's contributions to Wild Space's artistic vision and viability as an organization.
- Broadening Wild Space's reach to a new Milwaukee neighborhood. For 35 years, Wild Space has concentrated its site work on Milwaukee's East and West Sides. This project will bring the company the farthest South it has been in Milwaukee, exposing Wild Space to new audiences.

- Amplifying the voices of underrepresented dance artists, building minority artistic leadership, addressing racial disparities in the field of dance, and promoting cultural inclusivity by financially supporting 5 commissioned choreographers of color and the 15 dancers/musicians with whom they will work. Two-thirds of artists hired will represent Black, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC) communities. This has the added benefit of broadening the pool of artists with whom Wild Space will work in the future.

Produced by Wild Space Dance Company in partnership with Forest Home Cemetery and Arboretum, "Everyone is Welcome" will be created by 20 diverse choreographers, dancers and musicians, and engage 1,200 diverse audiences from nearby neighborhoods, Wild Space's regular patron base, and the Greater Milwaukee Area through 3 free, public performances in June 2023. In addition, the public will experience Wild Space's creative process through 3 on-site open rehearsals in May.

Working with Forest Home, Wild Space will promote the project through web and print marketing, direct mailings, social media, and word-of-mouth. The project will be promoted on Wild Space and Forest Home's websites, Facebook accounts (2,745 likes combined), Instagram accounts (760 followers combined), and email newsletters (2,440 subscribers combined). Wild Space will send postcards to 3,000 Wild Space and Forest Home patrons. Both partners will send press releases. Preview articles, paid advertisements, and reviews will appear in the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel, Milwaukee Magazine, Shepherd Express, Urban Milwaukee, and Milwaukee and Wisconsin Public Radio stations. Both partners' Board members - 24 in total-will promote the project, including Alderwoman JoCasta Zamarripa on the Board of Forest Home. Finally, the 20 diverse artists involved will reach out to their cultural communities, including Latinx, Asian, and African American, encouraging participation as volunteers and audiences.

Sara Tomilin, Executive Director of Forest Home Historic Preservation Association, reached out to Wild Space in July 2022, inviting the company to create a new dance performance on-site at Forest Home Cemetery and Arboretum. This is a new and strategic partnership for both organizations. Forest Home has the goal to open itself to the community as a cultural treasure and resource through public programming that activates the space and connects its rich past to the present. Wild Space has the goal to increase and diversify the

artists and audiences it reaches, as well as to create compelling new dance works in new parts of the city that illuminate the human condition. Forest Home offers the resources of in-kind rehearsal and performance space and lighting equipment, while Wild Space offers a unique programming experience for patrons. Both organizations will work collaboratively to share resources and co-promote the project.

Wild Space and Forest Home will work collaboratively to engage the many communities involved in this project. Artistic and production decisions will be made in consultation with Sara Tomilin, Executive Director of Forest Home, to honor and respect those in their community - both living and dead. Forest Home's 13-member Board of Directors and committed volunteers will connect Wild Space to the neighborhood, reaching out to new audiences and identifying places and people for artistic research. Wild Space's 5 diverse, bilingual choreographers will reach out to their communities - Latinx, Hmong, and African American - to participate as dancers/musicians, and to volunteer to support the production. A total of 15 volunteers (including bilingual volunteers) will help to guide patrons along Forest Home's scenic pathways to experience dance at 6 different sites of historic and cultural significance. Finally, Wild Space's 11-member Board of Directors, Forest Home's Board and 7-person staff team, and the project's artistic and administrative team consisting of Project/Artistic Director Debra Loewen, Managing Director Jenni Reinke, and the 20 artists involved, will work collaboratively to spread the word about the project through personal connections and social media.

Nationally-known expert/scholar on Milwaukee's past and present, John Gurda is a Milwaukee-born writer and historian who has been studying his hometown since 1972. He will serve as the project's primary humanities expert. He is the author of 22 books, including histories of Milwaukee-area neighborhoods, industries, places of worship, and historic cemeteries. Gurda's most ambitious efforts are "The Making of Milwaukee," the first full-length history of the community published since 1948; and "Milwaukee: City of Neighborhoods," a geographic companion that has quickly become the standard work on grassroots Milwaukee. Together the books total more than 900 pages and feature 2,000 illustrations. "The Making of Milwaukee" was the basis for an Emmy Award-winning documentary series that premiered on Milwaukee Public Television in 2006. In addition to his work as an author, Gurda is a lecturer, tour guide, and local history columnist for the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel. He is an eight-time winner of the Wisconsin Historical Society's Award of Merit. The common thread in all his work is an understanding of history as "why things are the way they are."

John Gurda will contribute historical content to the dance performance and program notes/study guide, and conduct a pre-show lecture followed by Q&A prior to each public performance, focusing on the history of Forest Home Cemetery, the evolution of its demographics and burial practices as a reflection of social changes, and the diverse people, cultures, and traditions represented there.

Victoria Isaac is an African American sociologist, educator, and dancer based in Milwaukee. She will serve as the project's secondary humanities expert. Her area of research and expertise is urban arts education. In particular, she is interested in addressing the principle of belonging - how definitions of belonging are both constructed by individuals and imposed upon them. As a dance educator, she is intentional about facilitating spaces where belonging is universally accessible to all individuals; it is not racialized, gendered, or marked in any way, shape, or form. She has worked with Wild Space Dance Company as a dancer and teaching artist in Wild Space's Milwaukee Public Schools residencies.

In February 2023, Ms. Isaac will provide a 45-minute training for Project/Artistic Director Debra Loewen, Wild Space Board and staff to strengthen the project and organization's commitment to diverse cultural exploration, creativity and community engagement. She will present research on how systemic oppression hinders the creative expression of socially marginalized populations, and offer tools in anti-bias, culturally

relevant and responsive frameworks for teaching and engagement. Project/Artistic Director Loewen will employ these approaches in working with the project's diverse choreographers and dancers/musicians of color, the Forest Home and Lincoln Village communities, and the diverse audiences who will attend.

John Gurda is a Milwaukee-born writer and historian who has been studying his hometown since 1972. He is the author of twenty-two books, including histories of Milwaukee-area neighborhoods, industries, places of worship, and historic cemeteries. Gurda's most ambitious efforts are *The Making of Milwaukee*, the first full-length history of the community published since 1948; and *Milwaukee*: *City of Neighborhoods*, a geographic companion that has quickly become the standard work on grassroots Milwaukee. Together the books total more than 900 pages and feature 2,000 illustrations. The Making of Milwaukee was the basis for an Emmy Award-winning documentary series that premiered on Milwaukee Public Television in 2006.

In addition to his work as an author, Gurda is a lecturer, tour guide, and local history columnist for the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel. He is an eight-time winner of the Wisconsin Historical Society's Award of Merit. The common thread in all his work is an understanding of history as "why things are the way they are."

John Gurda will contribute historical content to the dance performance and program notes/study guide, and conduct a pre-show lecture followed by Q&A prior to each public performance, focusing on the history of Forest Home Cemetery, the evolution of its demographics and burial practices as a reflection of social changes, and the diverse people, cultures, and traditions represented there.

Gurda plans to focus his research and talk on Forest Home's origins and development, highlighting:

- 1. The fundamentally egalitarian character of human life that we all "decay to the same elements" represented by the diversity of Forest Home's resident dead. Although it was founded by an affluent Protestant congregation and patronized at first by affluent Protestant families, Forest Home has evolved to serve a wide range of local ethnic groups, including German, Latino, Hmong, Muslim, and Black.
- 2. Changing American attitudes towards death, from historical burial practices to the evolution of modern burial rites, and Forest Home's honoring of a rich array of multicultural burial traditions.

Vang-Strath has danced professionally with Wild Space since 2009, has taught dance education programs in Milwaukee Public Schools and at Lawrence University, and has served as Board Vice President since 2015. She additionally has served on the Wisconsin Dance Council Board since 2019. In 2018, she served on the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction Dance Standards Writing Team. Since 2021, she has worked as an independent contractor with the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee Peck School of the Arts Department of Dance to advise the redesign of the K-12 Dance Education Certification Program to prepare 21st century elementary dance educators to teach with an emphasis on culturally responsive pedagogy. In addition to her

contributions to dance, since 2013, she has served as a full-time Milwaukee Public Schools K-5 Educator and currently teaches at Milwaukee Academy of Chinese Language.
